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

GRAF Rheeneehaanjii PBS Series Leading Edge

The PBS award winning series *Leading* Edge, hosted by coach Jimmy Johnson, aims to deliver educational programming on unique programs across the country. Our FNA GRAF Rheeneerhaanjii program was chosen to record an overview of the program for it's unique and challenging substance abuse program designed to address not only youth substance abuse problems but to assist them in identifying and/or working on other challenges that make recovery harder, such as community, family, peer, educational, legal, and/or medical problems. The staff at GRAF along with the Behavioral Health Services Director, Perry Ahsogeak, recorded on site in October 2014.

GRAF is a voluntary based adolescent program that expects a commitment of participation by the youth, their families, and community representatives.

FNA's Position In Response To Ballot Measure 2

This article is to clarify FNA's position regarding the State of Alaska's election results. This fall the election included a ballot measure concerning the legalization of marijuana use in the State, which was passed. The drug testing policy of FNA has not changed by the legalization of medical and recreational marijuana use in the State of Alaska.

FNA's Alcohol and Drug Use & Testing Policy (Policy I-10) states the following:

"As a federal grant recipient, FNA and its employees are required to comply with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988 (41 USC 701). The Drug-Free Workplace Act applies to all federal grants, regardless of dollar amount, and all federal contracts in excess of \$25,000; therefore, all departments of FNA are affected. Under the Drug-Free Workplace Act, an employee must notify FNA of a criminal conviction for drug-related activity occurring in the workplace. The report must be made within five days of the conviction."

Based on the referenced policy above, the reported presence of marijuana in an employee's drug test result will be considered positive, and the FNA policy will be applied accordingly.

Annual Employee Training

FNA programs strive to ensure quality services in a professional manner to all of Fairbanks. Our programs and staff attend trainings so that services provided remain to benefit the community.

Recently, our Head Start 0-5 staff attended their annual pre service training prior to the beginning of the school year to keep the staff updated on the early childhood curriculum and head start needs. The Behavioral Health Services staff also attended their annual training to stay updated on the continuously changing requirements of behavioral health guidelines.

The Head Start 0-5 pre service held in August & September 2014, BHS Annual Training was held in October 2014.













FNA Community Services held their grand reopening of the Hannah Solomon Elders' Building on November 21, 2014. The kitchen renovation was largely funded by Doyon, Limited and also funding from the State of Alaska. Interior Regional Housing Authority (IRHA) was contracted to lead the work which was completed this past summer. During this time, the Elders utilized the Poldine Carlo Head Start Building for luncheons. The renovation expanded the Elders building and upgraded the kitchen appliances. The space is utilized for Elders lunches, events, and visiting. Thank you to the funders and all who contributed to making the facilities a beautiful place for Elders to gather. This project has taken staff years to dream, design, and complete. We appreciate the hard work of our staff and partners.

The grand reopening featured a turkey dinner with all the fixings for the Elders and contributors of the project to enjoy.









Tribal Home Visiting

FNA Tribal Home Visiting (THV) program is a comprehensive early childhood education and family support program designed to honor traditional values in supporting parents as they raise healthy happy children. The goal of the FNA Tribal Home Visiting Project is to support the development of healthy, happy, successful Alaskan Native/American Indian children and families. THV uses the time tested, high quality Parents as Teachers curriculum to help you meet your parenting goals. An example of the activites the parent educators bring to your home is the Pretend Potlatch, which you can do at home with your children.

Pretend Potlatch Activity Pretend Picnic: Imagining and Showing Understanding

Potlatch: A gift giving feast, a celebration where Traditional Native Foods are served. Starting with moose soup and pilot bread crackers, meat, salmon strips and hot tea. Dessert of berries is also enjoyed.

Activity: Find items in your home such as a Soup pot, tea pots, bowls, spoons, stir spoons, potlatch scarves, big bowl and wooden spoon for drumming, box of lipton tea, box of pilot bread crackers, cups, butter knife and yellow yarn.

*Give your child the soup pot and ask them to help you cook moose soup.

- *Using parallel talk, describe what your child is doing while he explores his imagination.
- *Start the pretend picnic eating moose soup, crackers, meat, salmon strips, and drinking hot tea then serving a dessert of berries. Encourage your child to be the server.
- *Encourage your child to pretend to pour tea and stir in sugar. Pouring involves eye and hand coordination. It also involves the same wrist movement that is used in writing.
- *Use the big bowl and wooden spoons to drum, sing and dance while holding the scarves.

Rationale: Your child is engaging in pretend play as they take on the role of the moose soup Cooker, the server and helper. Your child will enhance their imagination as you offer your child opportunities to pretend play. When pretending, they are learning that they can act out something that they have done before. Their memory is increasing. It also gives the child opportunities to learn about our Native culture. For information on the FNA THV program call 907-451-1005.


