PROGRAM HISTORY

FNA Head Start opened its door in 1993 with the original Head Start site located on Second Avenue, providing part day center-based services for 60 children and home-based services for 22 children. The original program had 15 employees. FNA expanded by opening the Early Head Start Site on 3rd Street in 1998, serving an additional 80 families in center-based and home-based options.

Through the years the program has grown and in 2014 FNA restructured its Early Childhood Division, bringing Early Head Start and Head Start together to operate as one FNA Head Start 0-5 program. Due to families interest in the preservation of Alaskan Native languages, in 2017 a locally designed option began offering a dual language classroom teaching the Dennakke' language at Anne Wien Elementary.

Our most recent success is the purchase and renovation of the new Poldine Carlo building located at 3830 South Cushman with 203 children currently receiving services from this one site. Additionally, in 2019 FNA Head Start 0-5 served 100 children from three additional locations.: McKinley Site, Denali Elementary and Anne Wien Elementary.

South wing renovations at the Poldine Carlo building will be complete in the fall of 2020, creating an infant and toddler wing and allowing all but the McKinley Site to operate from the new building. Plans are being completed so that by September of 2023 all 303 children will be served from the Poldine Carlo building.



PROGRAM OVERVIEW

FNA Head Start 0-5 provides a comprehensive child and family development program for children prenatal to age five and their families, focusing on serving children and families experiencing poverty or trauma. We support children's growth and development in a positive learning environment through a variety of services which include:

Early learning: Children's readiness for school and beyond is fostered through individualized learning experiences. Through relationships with adults, play, and planned and spontaneous instruction, children grow in many aspects of development. Children progress in social skills and emotional well-being, along with language and literacy learning, and concept development.





Health: Each child's perceptual; motor, and physical development is supported to permit them to fully explore and function in their environment. All children receive health and development screenings, nutritious meals; oral health and mental health support. We connect families with medical, dental, and mental health resources to ensure that children are receiving the services they need.

<u>Family well-being</u>: Parents and families are supported in achieving their own goals, such as housing stability, continued education, and financial security. We support and strengthen parent-child relationships and engage families around children's learning and development.



The goal of the program is to improve child and family outcomes, including school readiness.

FNA HEAD START 0-5 SCHOOL READINESS GOALS

Physical Development & Health

- 1. Children will develop control of fine and large muscles for movement, navigation, and balance.
- 2. Children will develop healthy habits and safe practices.
- 3. Children will begin to learn to internalize rules, routines, and directions.
- 4. Children will develop and engage in positive relationships with peers and interactions with adults.

Approaches to Learning

- 5. Children will sustain attention to tasks and persist when facing challenges.
- 6. Children will demonstrate interest, curiosity, and eagerness in exploring the world around them.

Language & Literacy

- 7. Children will understand and begin to use oral language for conversation and communication, incorporating sign language when appropriate.
- 8. Children will demonstrate receptive and expressive language skills and communication strategies.
- 9. Children will begin to learn and demonstrate how print works.

Cognition and General Knowledge

- 10. Children will learn and begin to use math concepts during daily routines and experiences.
- 11. Children will gain knowledge of math and problem solving, and develop scientific inquiry through a sense of wonder about their physical and natural environment.
- 12. Children will demonstrate knowledge of numbers and counting.
- 13. Children sort, classify and organize objects.

PROGRAM SERVICE OPTIONS

Center -Based Option (Ages 6 weeks to 5 years):

Center-based services focus on health, nutrition, education, and cultural activities provided in a classroom setting.

- Part Day Services: FNA had 6 Part Day Classes, 3 morning classes and 3 afternoon classes offered Monday through Thursday, 4-6 hours per day,

 - Part-year, August June
- Extended Day Services: FNA had 8 Extended Day Classes for parents/guardians in training, school, searching for work or currently employed. The Extended Day Classes are offered Monday through Thursday, 10 hours per day.
 - o 1 Extended Day Infant Room 7:30am-5:30pm
 - o 5 Extended Day Toddler Rooms 7:30am-5:30pm
 - o 2 Extended Day Preschool Rooms 7:30am-5:30pm
 - Year-round, August July
- Locally Designed Services: FNA had 1 Preschool Dual Language AM Part Day Class teaching Dennakke' along with English at Anne Wien Elementary School. The children met for classroom experiences offered Monday through Thursday, 6 hours per day.
 - o 1 AM Preschool Room 9am-3pm
 - Part-year, August May

Home-Based Option (Ages Prenatal to 5 years):

This option offers weekly educational home visits with Home Visitors as well as two monthly group socials.

2 Head Start Combination classes (1 AM class and 1 PM class) were offered at Denali Elementary School. The children met for classroom experiences twice a week with one monthly home visit by their teacher/home visitor from September through May. During the summer months this adjusts to weekly educational home visits and group socials in the community.





2019 OHS FOCUS AREA 2 FEDERAL REVIEW MONITORING RESULTS

From April 1, 2019 to April 5, 2019, the Administration for Children and Families (ACF) conducted a Focus Area Two (FA2) monitoring review of the Fairbanks Native Association Head Start 0-5 program. This review included meeting with a review team that guided discussions and audited specific performance measures and the associated Federal regulations.

The review covered six areas:

- Program Management and Quality Improvement
- Education and Child Development Services
- Health Program Services
- Family and Community Engagement Services
- Fiscal Infrastructure
- Eligibility, Recruitment, Selection, Enrollment, and Attendance (ERSEA)

We received our monitoring report on 06/22/2019 and the program was found in compliance in each area except for an area of noncompliance for HSPPS 1302.15(a) Attendance. With 120 days to correct the reporting error, a plan was put in place and documentation submitted for further review. A letter from ACF was received on January 02, 2020 stating the area of noncompliance was closed.



2019 FEDERAL REVIEW CLASS OBSERVATION RESULTS

The Office of Head Start onsite CLASS® review was conducted from 04/29/2019 to 05/01/2019. Observations were conducted in preschool center-based classrooms using the Pre-K Classroom Assessment Scoring System (CLASS®). The CLASS® tool looks at three domains and ten dimensions of teacher-child interactions and measures those observed interactions on a seven point scale.




