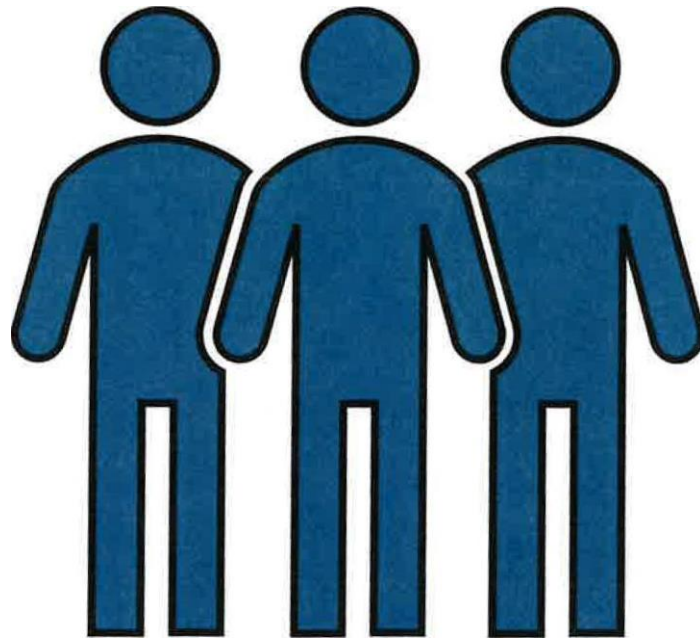

- **Alaskan Native Outreach & Resiliency:** A program that provides services to include medication management, psychotherapy, case management, vocational resources and family support to prevent the onset of psychosis and lessen the severity of psychotic disorders among youth and young adults.

Midnight Sun Academy: A school located within the Residential Treatment Center that is designed to allow students the opportunity to continue their education. Students attend school five days a week during the school year and are enrolled as members of the Fairbanks North Star

Borough School District. The education program also operates a two-month summer school session. In addition to core academic areas, all students are offered daily recreation in the full-sized gymnasium. Special education staff oversee Individual Education Plans for students and occupational, physical, and speech therapy as required.

Adolescent Co-Occurring Treatment (ACT): The primary focus of FCSEA's Adolescent Co-Occurring Treatment program (ACT) is to provide services in a nurturing family environment to youth with a co-occurring mental health and substance use disorder diagnoses. The length of stay for youth admitted to the program is expected to range from 120 to 365 days and will vary, dependent upon the youth's commitment to treatment, ability to build resiliency and attain measurable behavioral, cognitive, and affective changes that support recovery.

Gateway to Recovery (GTR): A medical inpatient withdrawal management program open to all Alaska residents. Patients will receive support from 24 hour medical supervision and assistance in their next steps of recovery. We help safely and comfortably withdraw from alcohol, opioids, and stimulants such as methamphetamines. GTR will also help people needing medical supervision starting on buprenorphine (Suboxone) in a safe and supportive environment.

Tanana Chiefs Conference (TCC): TCC is an Alaska Native Health corporation working towards meeting the health and social service needs of Tribal members and beneficiaries throughout the Doyon Region including Fairbanks.

TCC has broad array of behavioral health services located in Fairbanks specifically for Alaska Natives and American Indians. These include:

- **Wellness & Prevention:** Behavioral Health works in partnership with the Medical Department and Prevention and Wellness to provide prevention services throughout Interior Alaska, including tobacco policy and prevention, behavioral health and substance use education, suicide prevention, safety, and diabetes. Behavioral Health works in partnership with the Medical Department and Prevention and Wellness to provide prevention services throughout Interior Alaska, including tobacco policy and prevention, behavioral health and substance use education, suicide prevention, safety, and diabetes.
- **Early Intervention:** Behavioral Health Consultants are located at Chief Peter John Tribal Building, Al Ketzler Sr. Building, and Chief Andrew Isaac Health Center. They provide mental health and substance use screenings, brief interventions, and health education. They provide screening and pretreatment: Clinical Associates work in partnership with the outpatient programs, providing Early

Intervention Services to clients including individual counseling, group counseling, substance use assessments, mental health and substance use prevention and education.

- **Housing First:** Provides safe housing for the vulnerable homeless population in Fairbanks regardless of a person's substance use problems
- **Outpatient:** Includes Psychiatry/SMI Case Management Therapy: A person centered, interactive process through which an individual works with a clinician and explores thoughts, feelings, and behaviors, to support the individual in achieving an improved quality of life. Staff have specialization in various treatment approaches. The typical cycle of care is 12 weeks. They provide services to clients starting at age 4.
- **Psychiatry:** A medical specialty devoted to the treatment of mental health disorders, including various emotional, behavioral, cognitive, and perceptual disorders. The psychiatrists evaluate, prescribes, and monitors medications to best meet the needs of the patient. Services are dependent on the maturity of the patient.
- **Residential:** Old Minto Family Recovery Camp is an ASAM level 3.5 Clinically Managed High-Intensity Residential treatment

program. Clients stay for a minimum of 35 days to give them enough time to get a good foundation for their recovery. After completing residential treatment at Old Minto clients will most likely be recommended for aftercare services to reinforce the progress made in treatment.

- **SMI Case Management:** Case managers typically work with adults who are experiencing serious mental illness (SMI). Clients may need assistance with daily living skills, obtaining stable housing, medication management, meeting scheduled appointments, and assistance obtaining financial aid. The case manager advocates and supports clients regarding social, educational, legal, and treatment needs, and with accessing additional resources and support systems.

- Home Based (Prenatal — 5 years of age): This option offers weekly educational home visits that last at least 1 1/2 hours, as well as community-based socialization activities twice a month for two hours, beginning in August and operating year-round.
- Extended Day Center Based (6 weeks - 5 years): The Extended Day classes are Monday through Thursday, 8:00 am-5:15 pm, beginning in August and operating year-round.

Opioid Overdose Quick Guide

Signs of an overdose: Look for the following signs and symptoms to identify a potential overdose:

- Loss of consciousness, limp body
- Slowed breathing, choking
- Small, "pinpoint" pupils
- Pale, blue or cold skin
- Slowed heart rate

**If you see someone exhibiting ANY of these symptoms, dial 911 immediately. **

What to do in a suspected overdose emergency:

- 1.) Dial 911 immediately.
- 2.) Administer Naloxone (Narcan or Evzio Autoinjector) if available.
- 3.) Try to keep the person awake and breathing and stay with them if able.
- 4.) Turn the person on their side to prevent choking.
